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

The **DML app was redesigned** for a more responsive mobile experience. The new app allowed users to search for items in the Library's collection, reserve materials, see what they have checked out, find Branch locations and hours, and access a digital version of their Library card.

• For digital news consumers, DML began offering free 72-hour accounts to access NYTimes.com and the NYTimes apps. Also, DML offered full-color, fullpage Dayton Daily News, available for viewing the same day as the print edition.

• DML joined with the American Library Association and hundreds of other libraries across the nation to voice our concern with publishers who wanted to limit library patrons' access to eBooks.

 Adults and children with developmental disabilities enjoyed an expanded collection of highinterest/low-vocabulary books, both fiction and nonfiction, thanks to a \$7000 grant from the Disability Foundation, a fund of The Dayton Foundation.



DAYTON ART INSTITUTE FAMILY PASSES were added to

the DML collection this year, enabling families to explore the wonders of the DAI for free. Passes could be borrowed just like books, and pass holders could return to the museum as often as they liked during the three-week loan period. This was just the latest collaboration between DML and the DAI - a partnership which also oversees the **Relmagining Works** project, ensuring that original, permanent art installations are featured elements of each new or newly-remodeled DML location.

AN EXTENSION OF DML'S SERVICES FOR **NEW AMERICANS**

DML created an original exhibit called TRACE YOUR **ROOTS.** Visitors were invited to celebrate Dayton's rich cultural diversity while connecting with their own immigration story through self-guided, interactive stations. The exhibit provided opportunities to virtually follow a refugee's difficult journey, experiment with language translation, test U.S. civics knowledge, and compose music using digital "instruments" from around the world. Resources for genealogy research, a collection of local recipes, and a guide to ethnic dining in the Dayton area were also featured in the exhibit, made possible by a grant from The Dayton Foundation, support from the DML Foundation, the Dayton Foundation, and Jeff and Ellen Ireland.

 A traveling exhibit invited children (and adults) to peer into a Storybook Dollhouse full of clues to beloved children's books, fairy tales and nursery rhymes. Play stations, funded by the DML Foundation, turned elements of the dollhouse into life-sized, hands-on fun.



New **Editing Suites** at the Main Library, equipped with video editing, compression and graphic tools, allowed users to produce, import, repair, process, and master audio files. The Suites can be used alone or in conjunction with the Library's Green Screen technology.

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• An original exhibit, **19th Amendment: Towards Equality for All,** commemorated the 100th anniversary of Ohio's ratification of women's right to vote with vintage photos, speeches, and other items from the Library's extraordinary Women's Suffrage Collection, one of the largest of its kind in the nation.

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The 2019 SUMMER CHALLENGE was

"out of this world" with a **Universe of Stories** theme. Grand prizes gave families fun experiences at the National Museum of the U.S. Air Force, Carillon Historical Park, and even flights on the Wright "B" Flyer. Midway through the Summer Challenge, **Party in the Park** brought hundreds of families to Cooper Park and the Main Library for games, theatrical performances and entertainment. A final celebration of reading and learning took place at the Boonshoft Museum of Discovery.

In 2019, DML launched an ambitious, multi-faceted collaboration to support the region's Third Grade Reading Guarantee. The heart of the project was *Felix & Fiona*: The Big Stink and Other Adventures, an original chapter book which follows best friends Felix and Fiona as they navigate the challenges and triumphs of third grade. Designed to delight children while meeting educational standards of the third grade curriculum, the book was only one part of this project. A lively musical production

brought the final chapter of the book to life for young audiences, and an audio version of the book was produced, so kids could listen and read along with the print book in hand.

The project was funded by **DML Foundation, State** Library of Ohio with support from the Institute of Museum and Library Services, Frank M. Tait Foundation, and the Ohio Arts Council.



1,100 third graders enjoyed the production at 15 Dayton Public **Schools,** and they all received their own copy of Felix & Fiona, The Big Stink & Other Adventures.

Studies show that **third grade reading** proficiency is the single greatest indicator in determining high school graduation success. Research also shows that students comprehend content at two grade levels higher when they experience it in audio format rather than print alone. Retention increases further when content is added to music.

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

Career Adventures received financial support from Fifth Third Foundation, State Library of Ohio, Dayton Area Chamber of Commerce, and Levin Porter Architects.



This new Branch is 50% larger than the previous building. It features a reflections-themed Children's Area and original art installations by Suzanne Ley and Susan Cannon, Brent Beck, Paula Kraus, and Dan Cleary. In a nod to its history, beams from the old building were incorporated into the ceiling of the new Quiet Reading Room.



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


CHECK OUT THE NEW SOUTHEAST BRANCH
